He assisted with recruiting at job fairs and on Ft. Bliss, Texas and throughout the City of El Paso. Omar then returned to the Central Regional Command as a Community Representative where he worked resolving problems in the community. Omar also worked with different agencies in helping to resolve homelessness due to the Covid pandemic.

Omar Rivera created the Duty to Intervene Course to be taught to the entire El Paso Police Department for quarterly training and has now partnered with Texas Police Trainers LLC to administer this training statewide for the Texas law enforcement community.
